With school back in session...we have already started seeing illness spreading!! Strep and Covid are on the rise at CAC, as well as stomach viruses. Please encourage your children to:

Wash their hands!! Don't share drinks!! Cover their mouth & nose when they cough/sneeze!! Put the electronic devices down & get a good night's sleep!!

One way to help the nurse with the increase in visits to the nursing/health office is to make sure you have a current Over the Counter medication administration form on file. These need to be completed and submitted every school year in order for your child to receive any medication, including cough drops, from the nurse. Please contact the nurse if you do not know if you have one on file

If you send in a signed Over the Counter medication form, please send the medication, in the original bottle, with your child. We can store it in the nurse's office for the school year. There is a very limited supply of over the counter medication that the nurse has available and it is for Emergency Use Only!

CAC does not keep chewable medications in stock! If your child can't swallow pills please send in chewables!!

My name is Kaytee Deines and I am the 4th through 8th grade math and reading interventionist at Carbondale Attendance Center. My position is a part of the Title Program for the district. In the next week or two your child may come home with a student compact to be signed in order to be a part of our program. Here is how a student qualifies:

*FastBridge Learning assessment program that provides universal screening, progress monitoring, skills analysis, and instructional guidance. This assessment is taken 3 times a year (fall, winter, spring) for both math and reading.

*95% Group Phonics Screener for Intervention for Reading and EnVision Diagnostic Placement for Math.

*Teacher observations within the classroom, as well as demonstration of isolated delays in the mastery of skills.

Fall Sports are underway! Our Cross country, volleyball, and football teams began practices on August 14 in preparation for the 2023 sports season. Volleyball will kick off the Junior High sports schedule at Jefferson West Triangular with Anthony MS on August 29. They will return for their first home meet of the season on September 5th against Prairie View. It's a semester class and they continue to practice their keyboarding skills along with more advanced skills in google apps along with introduction to the Microsoft Office programs. They will also do a small unit on financial literacy where they learn about budgeting, needs vs wants and experience a Game of Life digital activity where they figure their budget, taxes and deductions with a career choice they randomly choose.

The students will also have access to 3D pens, 3D printer, a Cricut to support their projects they will choose throughout the semester from coding, 3D design, research projects, animation, game and app creation, Artificial Intelligence and more as their options are unlimited. I encourage the students to challenge themselves and add to their skills so their future has no limitations.

The students first assignment was to design an All About Me digital poster using the program of their choice to tell me about themselves. They were also to focus on their design skills with contrasting colors, font styles and being creative.


Weights and PE

As we begin another school year the PE department is getting into full swing. Coach Staten is in year #2 of running the weights program and Coach Duncan is in year #25 running the PE program. The overall goal of the PE department is to add a variety of activities, encourage participation, and work towards activities that can lead to an active lifestyle later in life. The weight program is in the process of going through lifting fundamentals and techniques with an emphasis on weight room safety. Coach Staten says: "Its important for us to give the students a good workout but more important for us to ensure safety and fundamentals into the beginning weight lifters." As the year progresses the students will be progressing to Locomotor and plyometric movements that help build body weight strength, muscular endurance, and mobility. This semester Coach Staten will also be adding a bicycling unit to build leg strength.

The PE class is divided into weekly units that offer a variety of activities that range from volleyball, floor hockey, pickleball to even tailgate games. Coach Duncan beleives that learning the basic principles of these games will come in handy at some point. "The more activities you put in front of kids, the more likely they are to enjoy or find a passion that suits them." "Not all kids like the same things, so a good variaty is important." The message Coach Duncan often Delivers is: PE class should be fun, it should be about activity, learning how to conduct yourself in a competative enviroment, and learning how to communicate and show teamwork.
