



Body produces insulin but can't use it well



Leads on Learning

As we finish out first quarter I wanted to provide parents with two resources that can be used at home to support fluent readers with great comprehension skills. ReadWorks is a free resource that parents can sign up for online and find grade level passages for their child. If you child struggles with oral reading I suggest going down one to two grade levels and gradually working up to build confidence. These passages also include vocabulary and comprehension questions. CommonLit is another great resource to increase your child's fluency and comprehension skills. This is another free website where parent's can sign up for a free account, and find passages with comprehension questions based on grade level. Have your child read out loud to you often!

Early Winter Sports

Fall sports are officially finished, and we are onto our early winter sports season at the Junior High level. Both girls basketball and boys wrestling are in full swing!

A quick recap of our fall sports results...

Volleyball competed in the league tournament in Osawatomie on October 5th. Our 8th grade team finished their season as Pioneer League Runner-Up with a league record of 8-1, and an overall season record of 13-4. The 7th grade team finished their season 15-2, with a 9-0 league record, and Pioneer League Championship. Cross country closed out its season on October 17. Our boys team finished in 2nd place in the league and had the overall individual champion, Wyatt Wood, at the league meet with a time of 13:00.81. Football finished the season competing in the 8th Grade bowl game vs Anderson County on October 22. This was a great opportunity

Technology Classes

4th & 5th grade

The 2nd nine weeks has started and Mrs. Hayes and Mr. Adams' classes have computer class during the 2nd and 4th quarter. The 4th graders have computer class every other day.

We started off the new nine weeks with getting to know you activities including an All About Me hoodie or backpack design. The students are encouraged to be creative, add details and design to their All About Me paper hoodie or backpack and to try new designs such as bubble letters and draw images that reflect their favorites.

Students will learn how to type with home row typing technique that they will practice daily with either a formal typing lesson using typing.com or their daily assignments.

The students first project will be a google slide show about technology terms and students will review and learn new skills such as inserting images, word art, color contrast between background and the text along with transitions and animations.

6th Grade

A new group of students are starting their computer class this 2nd nine weeks. The 6th graders' computer class is for a one nine week time frame.

The students will be learning about digital citizenship which includes new vocabulary and all the do's and don'ts when living in a digital world.

Students will continue to practice and work on their typing technique on Tuesday and Thursdays using typing.com. They will also be encouraged daily to practice those typing skills as they work on daily lessons that will involve the google programs (docs, sheets, slides) and also learn how to use canva.com.



7th/8th Grade

As we start our 2nd half of this semester with the 7th/8th grade computer classes, they are finishing up on a google sheets unit where they are learning how to create math formulas for the spreadsheet to add, subtract, average, find maximum and minimum within a set of numbers. The students will also learn how to set up data to create charts and graphs with google sheets.

Students will continue to practice typing skills using typing.com and they are encouraged daily to practice those typing skills in their daily lessons and everytime they are in front of a keyboard.

During the rest of the semester, students will review google slides and learn how to use google forms to create surveys along with using the google drawing program.

Students will continue to work on independent projects that provide them a wide variety of technology and innovative programs, skills and interests. Students are learning 3D design, using the 3D pens, coding, use of the Cricut and how to use google sheets for pixel art or a wordsearch creator. Students will also add specific projects to show what they learned using google sheets and the use of the math forumulas such as a shopping spree.

I encourage the students to think outside the box and if they can tie their project to a technology skill or many skills then I allow their project idea. The students work on these projects when they are done with their regular assigned work and most Fridays are set aside for project work time.

The last part of the semester, the students will learn about the basics of financial literacy, the vocabulary, budgeting and running a lemonade stand through the banzai simulation website along with the connection of having a career to provide them with financial choices and freedom.




Ouilt Block Patterns Exploring different kinds of balance in 6th grade



Mental Heath Minute



Social media can be a valuable tool for communication and creativity. It also comes with risks, such as bullying, privacy concerns, exposure to inappropriate content, and increased anxiety and depression. As your children navigate the challenges of social media, it is essential to provide guidance and set clear boundaries. Establishing boundaries helps protect your child while fostering responsible online behavior. Below are some tips for setting social media boundaries.

- Open communication and establishing rules Create a safe space to talk about social media by asking questions about your child's online interactions, discuss acceptable content, and find out what friends they interact with.
- Monitor social media usage and content Regularly check in on your child's social media accounts. Use parental controls and keep devices in shared spaces.
- Educate your child about the dangers of sharing personal and private information, including location, phone numbers, and other identifying information.
- Lead by example and encourage offline activities.
