Coffee Shop Soft Launch

1st Semester Entrepreneurship students drafted a business plan for a school run coffee shop. After conducting market research and competition analysis, students were able to determine prices for products they hoped to provide in the future. This spring semester a group of Business Communications students are taking the challenge of running the shop. These students were taught the basics of making lattes and cappuccinos using industry equipment.

Over the week of January 27-31st students had a "soft open" of their shop. Offering a limited 12oz Hot Drink menu that was available for pre-order via email during specific limited hours each day. The students also acted as designers and created a mock-up of a drink menu and promotional materials using client specifications and their creativity.

2nd Semester Entrepreneurship students had their own business ideas that aligned with their interests. After a lengthy and entertaining brainstorming session, the group moved forward with an idea to make their own jerky. Using their community connections, students devised a plan to raise the needed funding and equipment to get started. After creating their own marinades, dehydrating meat and significant taste-testing, the Thundertaker Jerky Company packaged their first batch of products this week and made their first sales. Students have quickly learned by doing, and have been surprised at all the costs associated with running a business.

Construction Technology

In Mr. Stanton's construction technology class, we watched five informational videos about different trade jobs and ways to start your own business. I learned about a few trade jobs that will provide a good income if you have the proper work ethic, supplies, and financial state.

For example: What's causing the skilled labor shortage? Compared to past years, we do not have enough young people coming into trades and learning useful life skills. Instead high schools are pushing kids toward college instead of going straight into the workforce. What are the highest paying jobs that no one talks about? Septic truck operators, basement waterproofers, and diesel compressor techs are all high-paying jobs that don't get mentioned often. All of these professions can be started on your own and be self-employed.

What trade job is right for me? To know which trade job is right for you, you have to consider your work ethic, personality, financial state, and what you enjoy doing in life.

Should I consider self employment? Self-employment is a good option to consider when you are young. Starting your own business as soon as you can could lead you on a pathway to success. Some of these jobs could be landscaping, fencing, parking lot striping, and window cleaning.
